## FCC ACTIONS

WBKY, University of Kentucky, was granted license to cover construction permit for new non-commercial educational broadcast station on 42,900 kc, with 100 watts. (3/14/41)

WTAW, Texas A & M, was granted modification of construction permit for increase in power and new equipment, for new transmitter (requesting 1150 kc under NABRA). (3/14/41)

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WBOE, Cleveland Board of Education, was granted license to cover construction permit for non-commercial education station, FM, on 42,500 kc with 1000 watts power. (3/14/41)

WOI, Iowa State College, was granted temporary authority to operate certain night periods in order to broadcast national basketball championship tournament games. (3/17/41)
